


Engineers of the future! Peirianwyr y Dyfodol!

Last Thursday 60 year 8 and 9 pupils were fortunate to have the opportunity to take part in a workshop run by the Smallpeice Trust which encouraged us to consider the design and engineering challenges of building an efficient wind turbine.

The day was very educational; we learnt how to build model wind turbines out of paper tubes and other common materials. We used engineering skills to construct a stable structure which could support the weight of the turbine at the top and learnt that different designs can seriously affect the wind turbines' performance.

The day was full of informative challenges combining creativity and science; it was great. I really learnt the true meaning of teamwork. Our team consisted five positions, team leader; marketing manager; finance manager; deputy leader and designer. In conclusion, the day revealed which wind turbine was the most efficient and that almost every team had been successful in creating a working turbine.
