
### **Confirmation Dates for the Parish of Flint**



Two groups of Year 8 students took part in a survival camp. They were greeted off the bus with the barking sound of Mr Roberts dressed in full military attire bellowing out instructions. Soon after they took part in a number different activities testing their teamwork, leadership and problem solving skills. This involved lighting fires, building bridges to cross a stream, a full army assault course, shelter building and a water slide!! The children took part whole-heartedly and had great fun. This proved to be an extremely rewarding experience for both staff and students.





#### Sustainable Science

Pupils in year 8 and 9 were treated to an interactive Science and Music Technology show hosted by Rob Wix of Sustainable Science. The children were able to learn about how sound travels, how objects around the home can be turned in to powerful speakers, and explored the links between mobile phone ringtones and computer games. They were able to explore how modern music came to life using the latest computer and keyboard technology, including the legendary Korg Triton Extreme synthesiser! The children thoroughly enjoyed the sessions and even had the chance to make some bottle music and straw kazoos afterwards, in a competition to create their own ringtone!



## **Go Below Underground Adventure**

Thirty-two Students spent most of Thursday in the cooling temperature of approximately 12°C underneath the mountains of Snowdon. Go Below Underground Adventure was a trek through an ancient slate mine, without the safety of barriers and stairs. We started by ascending to the mine shaft opening and following the mine cart track until we reached a flooded chamber, we then proceeded by boat, zip line, rock climbing, abseiling and eventually clambering waterfalls to another opening further up the mountain. In all we ascended six levels of the mine and enjoyed all the challenges it presented us with.




### Jodrell Bank.

Year eight pupils had recently expressed an interest in seeing how Maths and Engineering could be applied in real-life situations and decided that we should go to Jodrell Bank's Discovery Centre in Cheshire. We were able to experience the night sky in the planetarium session — exploring the planets, stars and galaxies and even created our own Mars Rover landing craft in a workshop designed to explore the engineering behind the original Mars Rover landing craft. The children had the opportunity to see the famous Lovell Radio Telescope and take part in a number of hands-on activities in the Discovery Centre. The children had a wonderful, albeit hot day and hope to return again in the future.



# Global Rock Challenge Year 9

The whole of Year 9 were involved in a Global Rock Challenge on Friday. This was led by Lynn and Suzie from Business Solutions. The students worked in teams to promote a new Rock or Musical Band. ## Caerdydd - Blwyddyn 9



Forty-one Year 9 students spent two days in the capital city at the start of the week. The first day was spent in Cardiff city centre including lunch by the castle, a tour of the Millennium Stadium and the opportunity to go shopping around St David's 2 Shopping Centre.

Wednesday was spent down at Cardiff Bay, starting with a boat trip around the bay and up to the barrage. We then went walking to the spectacular Welsh Millennium Centre to learn more about the history of Cardiff and the bay area. After lunch at the Senedd building, pupils then went around the bay – many returning with an assortment of ice creams – before heading to Techniquest to finish the visit with some science experiments and activities. ### **Red Cross**

We welcomed representatives from the Red Cross to work on leadership and survival skills. Pupils had to erect tent shelters and to make it more difficult they had to imagine they had hurt a hand. They could only use their 'uninjured' hand!! They also undertook a 'Stepping Stones' activity which helped them develop trust and initiative.



## **Puppet Making**

Students were involved in a drama workshop led by Mrs Fitzjohn. They were introduced to puppetry by watching a DVD showing how the effects were achieved in War Horse. They, then produced a paper

puppet and created a short sketch based around the puppet they had made.





#### **Totem Pole Building**

Children in year seven learned all about sustainability, reusing, recycling and reducing waste as part of a project designing and building a school totem pole! The children decided that elements of the totem pole should reflect their perception of life at St Richard Gwyn school and included symbols of friendship, learning, peace, the Flint community and of course, their faith. The children created the totem pole out of completely recyclable materials in keeping with the sustainability theme and learned lots about the history of totem poles too! It was a fabulous day and the children are very proud of their achievement!
